Since we began supporting families all those years ago, Tŷ Hafan has supported 1,091 children and families through life, death and beyond.

As we reflect on the past 25 years, we acknowledge how much has been achieved, but also how much more there is to do.

On the 25th of January, we marked 25 years of Tŷ Hafan. On that day, we were as inspired as ever by the incredible drive and determination our founder, Suzanne Goodall, showed in creating Tŷ Hafan, the first children's hospice in Wales.


The Children in Wales Requiring Palliative Care: Trends in Prevalence and Complexity report, jointly commissioned with the Welsh Government and published last year, found that the number of children with life-shortening conditions in Wales increased by a quarter between 2009 and 2019, and the complexities of the conditions those children are living with continues to increase.

That means the families of 1 in 172 children in Wales are facing the unimaginable: their children are expected to die in childhood.

More importantly for Tŷ Hafan, the research showed that for every child and family in Wales we can support, there are 9 more that we are yet to reach. That's thousands of families who live every day knowing their child's life will be short, and they face it without any hospice support or palliative care.







That's why the next 25 years are so important.

Our ambition is that when a child's life will be short, no family should have to live it on their own. Today, too many families are living it alone.

This is a huge ambition. It means we must re-align our services so that every family has access to the right care, at the right time, in the right place, delivered by the right person. We must support more families closer to their homes, so they don't have to travel long distances to access the specialist care and support they need. We must make sure that families have more choice about where their child dies, including at home, and work closely with others so that families get the support that is right for them.

It's not going to be easy, but together we can make this happen.

25 years ago, Suzanne Goodall knew it wouldn't be easy to build Wales' first children's hospice. But thanks to her vision and perseverance - and the support of the people of Wales - she made it happen.

Imagine a Wales where **every** child has access to the services they need, where they need them and when they need them. A Wales where families have a choice about the care they receive. A Wales where no family faces the death of their child alone.

We don't just imagine this Wales, we believe in it. We hope you will too.

Rob, one of the skilled Chefs at Tŷ Hafan, has kindly shared his recipe for this moreish lemon loaf for your tea party.





Lemon loaf

Ingredients

For the cake

210g plain flour
1½ tsp baking powder
½ tsp salt
120ml warm milk
140g blueberries
3 tbsp lemon juice
170g unsalted butter
200g white granulated sugar
1½ tbsp lemon zest
3 large eggs
2tsp vegetable oil

For the lemon syrup

85g caster sugar Juice of 2 lemons.

14g cornflour.

For the lemon glaze

240g icing sugar 3 tbsp lemon juice.

Method

For the cake

- 1. Preheat the oven to 160°C (320°F) with the fan on and line an 8.5 x 4.5 inch loaf tin
- 2. Sieve together the flour, cornflour, baking powder and salt
- **3.** Combine the warm milk and lemon juice in a small bowl and let it curdle
- Cream the butter, vegetable oil, sugar and lemon zest until light
- 5. Add the eggs one at a time, mix in half of the milk and lemon juice mixture
- 6. Combine half of the dry ingredients, add the remaining milk mixture and finish with the rest of the dry ingredients; avoid overmixing

- 7. Stir in the blueberries
- 8. Pour the batter into the tin and bake for one hour or until a skewer comes out clean
- 9. Cool for 15 minutes.


For the lemon syrup

- 1. In a saucepan, heat the sugar and lemon juice until the sugar dissolves to make the syrup
- 2. Remove the loaf from the tin and cover it with the lemon syrup.

For the lemon glaze

- Combine the icing sugar and lemon juice in a bowl
- 2. Drizzle on top of the loaf and add lemon zest for decoration.

News from our care services



2024 is well and truly underway and we have lots of updates from our care services in the hospice and in the community that we're delighted to share with you.

Spotlight on...

Jemma, our Neonatal Clinical Nurse Specialist

In our last edition, we explained that we have seen an increase in referrals from Neonatal Intensive Care Units.

With medical advancements meaning that babies born very prematurely or with complex health conditions are living longer, along with the increasing awareness of the options when a baby comes to the end of their life, creating a new role specifically for palliative care support for babies at Tŷ Hafan was necessary.

Now, Jemma David has joined the Tŷ Hafan team in the new Neonatal Clinical Nurse Specialist role.



Working with babies can be very different to working with older children and teenagers, and this new role spans many areas. Jemma offers antenatal support to parents who find out that their baby's future is uncertain during pregnancy and can attend appointments with them to help them better understand their baby's health problems.



Jemma also helps with 'parallel planning', which is supporting families to consider what they want in place should their baby die, but also having a plan in place so that the family has the support they need to take their baby home if they do survive.

Jemma explained:

Tŷ Hafan provides more flexibility for families facing end-of-life care with their baby. As much as hospitals offer fantastic clinical care and support, it's still a clinical environment.

At Tŷ Hafan, quality time and memory making are a huge focus. Some families have taken their baby out to the gardens, overlooking the sea, to die in their arms in a peaceful setting - that kind of flexibility simply isn't available elsewhere.

Introducing... Family Support Volunteers

Following funding from the Hodge Foundation, we have started introducing Family Support Volunteers as part of a pilot project in Swansea Bay and Neath Port Talbot.

These volunteers help out in the homes and communities of the families we support. They take on basic DIY tasks, shopping, driving and housework to relieve some of the pressure on families who already have a lot to deal with.

A key part of this project is Debbie Allison, our Family Support Volunteer Manager. Debbie explained:

volunteers in homes and communities can be really beneficial. It's like a warm hug in the community, bringing a bit of Tŷ Hafan into the home to relieve pressure and social isolation.









Matthew and Micaela were 21 when they had their baby boy, Cai.

The joy of being first-time parents in a baby bubble quickly turned to fear and heartbreak when Cai became seriously unwell at just a few weeks old.

A cardiac arrest left him with extensive brain injuries and cerebral palsy. Matthew and Micaela were told the agonizing news that their baby only had one day to live.

But Cai survived the next day. And then the next. And the next. Even though he was still very unwell, Matthew and Micaela were just happy and grateful that their baby was alive.

But their relief turned into further devastation. Cai was diagnosed with an incredibly rare, incurable condition, Vici syndrome, which meant his life would be short. The medical team looking after Cai said that he wouldn't live past two years old, and he would live those short years with profound physical challenges. Heartbroken, they grieved for the life they thought they would have with their son.

Life was going to be very different for this young family. Instead of taking Cai to football practice on weekends, they lived a life of uncertainty beside his hospital bed.

Cai's medical team offered them a referral to Tŷ Hafan, but the thought of Cai going to a hospice seemed so final and Matthew and Micaela were not ready to say goodbye.

When they came visit, the hospice was not what they expected. It was warm, bright and homely, full of smiles and laughter. They instantly felt it was a safe and friendly place, full of love and life.

But there was no time to process what was happening. Weeks turned into months, and they had to live for each day.







The financial pressures and time constraints that came with caring for Cai full time meant they were just getting by and surviving. But they knew Tŷ Hafan was there for them every step of the way.



Even through all the dark days, Cai would bring sunshine.

He was always a happy little boy, full of character. He showed immense courage and bravery throughout his journey. He had the most infectious smile and, all his life, he defied the odds that were stacked against him.

When the time came to say goodbye, Matthew and Micaela knew they wanted Cai to die peacefully at Tŷ Hafan. The moment he entered the hospice, he opened his eyes. He was somewhere he felt safe. Matthew and Micaela knew their baby boy, and they knew those were going to be his last moments. He had never been that poorly before. Seeing him like that was even more painful than him not being here anymore.

Cai died when he was 11 years old. His death was peaceful. There was no struggle. It wasn't horrible. He just fell asleep in his dad's arms and didn't wake up.

He was surrounded with love and, when he died, Matthew and Micaela didn't feel alone in their grief. They felt the staff at Tŷ Hafan lost Cai, too. The emotion, support and love the staff showed brought great comfort.

It's because of your generosity that we could be there for Matt, Micaela and Cai throughout Cai's life, death and beyond.

But there is more work to be done. It's only with donations that we will be able to reach every family in Wales who needs us. Please help us make that Wales a reality.

My foster carers faced me having lots of medical procedures, especially when I had a kidney transplant at the age of four.

After 12 scary days in the high dependency unit, my new kidney woke up! This was a new start in my life, but many more operations and scary moments were to come.

The transplant operation made me more able, so I was allowed to travel. I have been to Australia, Thailand, Spain and Portugal. Australia is my favourite destination. Next year, I am going to Disney World in Florida, and I am looking forward to the adventure.





I am in Year 7. Starting at a new school was daunting, but I have settled in and enjoy the different lessons. History is my favourite lesson at school. My hobbies are playing Xbox, Fortnite and Roblox, and I like drawing which I am very good at.

I am on the Youth Board at Tŷ Hafan.
We debate topics around disability and social issues. We have recently been to Cardiff Museum to look at the issues that affect disabled people there, and to highlight changes that would benefit those with disabilities.

I have made many friends at Tŷ Hafan and I look forward to making many more. My journey in life will throw up challenges, but let's stay positive! Onwards and upwards!

A day in the life of. . . a Family Support Worker

Family Support Workers are a key part of our Family Wellbeing and Outreach Team. As well as working in the hospice, they work in local communities in Wales to make sure families get the specialist help they need wherever they need it.

We spoke to Amy, a Family Support Worker at Tŷ Hafan, to find out more about her crucial role.

"Family Support Workers work with families to support their emotional wellbeing. That could be long term, or until they start counselling," Amy explains.

We work one-to-one with families and in groups, putting on lots of events at the hospice and in local communities.

"The events are really varied. They can have a particular focus on mums, dads or siblings, or they can be for whole families. Each member of the family has different support needs, so we work hard to give everyone tailored support.

"My colleagues Emily, Dan and Kelly-Jo and I work together to make sure everyone who accesses Tŷ Hafan gets an equal service.

"Mine and Emily's community-based work is split geographically so that we can ensure each area is receiving an equal service. This is extremely important for our families in rural communities.

"Kelly-Jo primarily offers support for siblings, Dan primarily offers support for dads and me and Emily mainly offer support for mums and for whole families."



Tŷ Hafan events are driven by what families want to do. We put on spa days, coffee mornings and meet-ups in a variety of areas. We've noticed that some families want to do more adventurous activities, so a group of mums went axe throwing recently and it was a lot of fun!

Amy explains: "I love getting a large group of people together. It helps people connect. At these events, families might find out that they live just down the road from each other, or their children go to the same school. These events help families make their own connections and find a support system near to where they live.

One-to-one time with families is also crucial. Having a regular, reliable person to speak to who they know can understand their experiences can really help a family's wellbeing.







Our Community Hubs are also a big part of what we do. They take Tŷ Hafan's services into local communities in Wales so that we can reach as many families as possible.

"A lot goes on at the Community Hubs! The Family Support Workers' roles are to make sure families can connect and make friendships within their local communities. We do this by ensuring all the family has as much fun as possible, as well as being a listening ear."

Our Complementary Therapy Team goes along to Community Hubs to give families relaxing treatments like massage, and crafts and therapeutic play are both important features of these monthly community events."



"Bereavement support and memory making is a big part of my job, too," adds Amy. "When a child comes to us for end-of-life care, I help families create precious memories with their child through activities like making hand casts, creating artistic canvasses with handprints and saving locks of hair.

"My days are really varied. I can be running an event in the morning and, that same day, I may be needed to help a Family Support Practitioner with memory making.

"I love everything about my job. I always knew I wanted to help people and I started volunteering with children with complex needs from a young age. I'm so grateful to work somewhere I feel is my forever place.



"We can have very difficult days at Tŷ Hafan, but there's so much more than sadness.

Amazing things happen at Tŷ
Hafan. It isn't just a place where
children come to die – it's a
place to make the most beautiful
memories as a family. We do
everything we can to make a very
short life a very happy life.






